



# The Royal Standard

#### The meaning behind the Royal Standard

The Royal Standard flying over Windsor Castle in 2021. This is the

ceremonial flag which is about the size of a double decker bus!

The flag is divided into quarters and each image has a different meaning.



The three gold lions walking on a red field represent England.



The red lion standing on a gold field represents Scotland.



The gold harp on a blue field represents Ireland.



Other members of the Royal family have their own versions of the Royal Standard. A different version is also used in Scotland.

These images are of a Royal Standard flag in the museum collection. It was made and flown in Datchet when Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II visited as part of the Royal Progress from Hurley to Magna Carta Island on 18 October 1974. Object number : 2010.40



Here are some examples of what the different colours used on flags mean. Which will you use on your own Royal Standard?






### Animals & Meanings
